SURVIVAL AFLOAT by Don Biggs (McKay, 1976)

Safety and survival afloat are, or should be, of primary concern to all men and women who take to the sea in small or large craft.

SURVIVAL AFLOAT is about "preventive" survival; about the frequently simple, cheap, and easy measures any boater can take to prevent accidents, and about the skills and equipment needed for survival when an unforseen incident threatens loss of life.

In the author's words: "The essence of survival afloat is not in winning a game of high risk against the worst that the elements have to offer, it is in the preparation and planning that avoid the need to 'survive' at all.

SURVIVAL AFLOAT, by a skilled yachtsman, is an excellent way to prepare for the worst--the boating accident that each of us hopes will never occur.

COOKS

SALMON MINI-BITES

1 small can salmon
1 cup crushed corn flakes
 (% cup crumbs)
½ tsp. seasoned salt
2 tbsp. salad dressing

2 tsp. sweet pickle relish Corn flake crumbs

Flake salmon with juice, remove bones. Mix with crushed corn flakes and seasoned salt. Blend salad dressing with relish; add to salmon mixture; mix well. Form into bite-size balls. Roll in corn flake crumbs. Chill.

Makes 1 dozen; recipe may be doubled or tripled.


What is a MAREP?

It's not a newly discovered species of Marine life. It is a programme sponsored by the Canadian Hydrographic Service & Canadian Power Squadrons for the updating of Charts & Sailing Directions & here is where you come in.

Should you, on your cruises this summer, come across a structure, light, or conspicuous land formation which could be used as an aid to navigation that is not marked on your charts (even rocks or reefs!), make a note of the date, time, Lats. and Longs. as well as a description of your observation. Forms are available from CDR (Ret) Barbara Dyck. We turn them in for additions or corrections.

MID-SIZE POWERBOAT CHALLENGE

Fraser Power Squadron heard about the other side of Vancouver Island from Peter Vassilopoulos and Ian Campbell at its Annual General Meeting April 15 at the Richmond Inn.

Most of us are familiar with the "inside" or the east coast of Vancouver Island, either from actual cruising or perusing numerous charts. With our mid-sized, gas burning, planing hulls, we take a well-deserved skeptical look at the prospect of cruising that stretch of water. It was, therefore, most interesting for the members to hear first hand from Peter and Ian just what the "other side" is really like.

With a suitable boat and proper equipment, most of the problems are eliminated before the trip begins; however, it was interesting to learn of the weather conditions, navigation, fuel, moorage, and supplies. Of particular note was the abundance of fish, animal, and bird life. As a bonus when the weather was clear: Most spectacular scenery.

To those who would like to review the trip in much greater detail, pick up the October, 1976, and April, 1977, copies of "Pacific Yachting."

RESTRICTED RADIO LICENCE

DOC regulations require that all persons operating radio equipment other than Citizen's Band equipment must have a Radio Operator's Licence.

To assist members in obtaining their licences, tentative arrangements have been made with DOC to have an examiner available the evening of May 10, 1930 hrs., at Delta Junior High in Ladner.

All members attending the Local Knowledge course have been provided with the necessary study material. Members who are not in possession of this material should obtain a copy of the DOC publication entitled "Radiotelephone Operator Handbook--Land/Sea/Air," Catalogue No. C022-173, price 75 cents.

Although the exam is not difficult, a thorough review should be made of this material if you wish to take the test. If you have a VHF radio now or plan on obtaining one in the future, this is an excellent opportunity to obtain your Radio Operator's Licence. Incidentally, there is no charge for this licence.

All that is required is to:

(a) Review the appropriate study material;

(b) Phone Norm Dyck at 274-4887 no later than May 9 and let him know you plan to attend; and

(c) Show up at Delta Junior High, with all the answers, 1930, May 10.
