

First Lieutenant Carolyn Hoffman's duties include the following:


- obtain necessary bank forms for recording the signatures of the elected officers who are empowered to sign Squadron cheques, these being the Commander, Executive Officer, and Treasurer (any two of whom may sign cheques).
- in co-operation with Membership Officer collect annual and joining fees.
 - assist in financial matters of Squadron functions.
 - pay for supplies.
 - issue membership cards as dues are paid.
 - advise secretary of changes of address, telephone numbers, and changes in names of boats.
 - remit National portion of dues.
 - contact auditor.
 - prepare a financial statement and Treasurer's report.
 - submit a financial report to the National Treasurer and District Commander.
 - present financial statements at executive meetings.
 - receive and disburse funds as required for monthly meetings.
 - organize ticket sales for social functions.
 - pay appropriate bills.
 - periodically receive monies from Supply Officer covering sale of regalia. Pay invoices for materials and services.

HALLIDAY'S HOLIDAY

With a little bit of luck and the right decisions by those in authority, by 1984 you will have VHF telephone communications from anywhere in Desolation Sound and north to Port Hardy. This includes right up to the head of any inlet. All this is the result of a survey done this summer on Del Dash's "Dauntless".

It all began on July 10 when a crew arrived to instal the special equipment required aboard. After departing on July 11 we arrived at Heriot Bay, stopping at Secret Cove overnight. The following day the survey actually began. In one day we cruised through Desolation Sound, in and out of every bay, cove and to the end of every inlet on the way. This was to be the pattern for the next two weeks.

We had a land crew working with us by helicopter to set up and dismantle the temporary transmitters for the survey. In Walsh Cove we invited the land crew for dinner so everyone could get to know one another. The helicopter landed on a small islet at the entrance to Walsh Cove and, before we could catch up, they radioed that two adults, seven children and three dogs had rowed over to see what the problem was!

The next day we carried on, visiting Refuge Cove and the head of Toba Inlet before anchoring at Octopus Islands Marine Park. This is a highly recommended anchorage but watch for the rock with the blue bottom paint on it. For the next three days we carried on at reduced speed because of a bent shaft and prop, visiting through Green Point and Upper Rapids, Ramsay & Frederick Arms, Minstrel Island, part of Johnstone Strait and finally arriving in Alert Bay for our appointment with the shipyard on Saturday. We found out they might or might not decide to pull the boat so we carried on to Sointula. This is a pretty little town with a restaurant "par excellence" and numerous marine railways should you be unlucky enough to require such services.

Leaving Sointula the next morning with everything put to rights, we headed north into Fife Sound and adjacent areas. This is an area where very few boats seem to go (I think we met three in two days!!) yet it has some of the most beautiful scenery that I have ever seen. McKenzie Sound, which may from the chart look difficult to get into is really quite easy. The books warn us to be careful when going ashore because this is "Grizzly Country." However, we saw no bears. There are small coves to anchor in and a lovely meadow at the head of the Sound.

Near the entrance to McKenzie Sound lies Nepah Bay which is only accessible at high slack but would bear investigation if one had the time. Beside the entrance to Nepah Bay is the very interesting Reversing Falls. Drury Inlet is nearby with more and more anchorages and explorations possible.

The next few days were spent going right up to the end of Knight and Bute Inlets. Bute is probably the most spectacular with its 8,000' mountains and glaciers—well worth the time although anchorages are scarce. When we returned to Stuart Island we were greeted by a pod of killer whales who played around the boat for two days, leaving only to beat us through Hole-in-the-Wall.

We ended the survey at Campbell River on July 25 with a barbecue for all who had taken part. A great time was had by all.

Two books found to be most helpful were "Cruising Desolation Sound" and "Cruising Beyond Desolation Sound", both publications of "Pacific Yachting." With the explicit directions in these books, together with the "Sailing Directions" and detailed charts, we came through the diciest areas unscathed.

The trip covered 1,400 miles in 14 days in a 9 knot boat. Now I would like to go back and really explore.


