Our Executive officer Dave Mellis has now developed an anchoring course to demonstrate the propper way to anchor, and the features of each anchor which demonstrates in a small sand box. Smart Chart AIS for iOS >>>

Last August, we announced ActiveCaptain support in a new, free Android app called SmartChart AIS from Technology Systems, Inc. It provides full ActiveCaptain offline support over nautical charts in the US along with an AIS overlay and a location tracking system. It was developed as part of an US government contract.

Over the last few months we've been working with them to test their new version for iOS/iPhone. It's available now in the iTunes App Store and guess what? It's free too.

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Voluntary Courtesy Check

Several members of Fraser Squadron have taken the pleasure craft voluntary courtesy check course. This now enables Fraser Squadron to give courtesy safety checks. The course took place at the Richmond Yacht Club on a Saturday morning and was given by Hilary Lawson who is a boating safety officer with Transport Canada. The course covers those safety items which are outlined in the Safe Boating Guide. We decided to check some of our members at our Telegraphy Cruise.

Four boats were checked and only one of them passed! We had been told that this was the case in most checks and the results that day certainly were proof of that.

The two most frequent items under which boats fail are flares and fire extinguishers. I would like to talk a little further about these two items.

1.Flares

Depending upon the length of the boat there is a minimum number of flares that must be carried, and there is also a maximum number of certain types of flares that can be carried. All the flares on board must be no greater than four years old from the date of manufacture which is shown on the body of the flare.

2. Fire Extinguishers

Again depending upon the length of the boat there is a minimum size and number of fire extinguishers which must be carried. These extinguishers must also be checked and tagged as such every year. In order to make sure that the size of the extinguisher which you are about to purchase or already own you must check the

ULC code on the side.

For example;

1-A, 5-B,C Means that this is a 5ABC extinguisher.

3-A, 10-B,C Means that this is a 10 ABC extinguisher.

The numbers 5 and 10 which are the most common types that are required refer to the square footage of the fire that the extinguisher is designed to put out (5 square feet).

Please note that if you have a gun that fires single star flairs and you have four of these flairs this is considered to be only two flairs as you must fire two flairs within four seconds of each other. Make sure that the star flairs that you carry fire two stars.

May I also make one other comment and that is that as we asked for certain safety items the owner of the boat had to dig deep into lockers to find them. In an emergency situation where time is short and panic sets in everything should be easy to find and readily accessible.

These are only two of the items which are required under the Transport Canada Act. I would urge you to get a copy of the Safe Boating Guide and make sure that you comply with the minimum standards for your boat.

Failure to do so may result in a fine if you are stopped and checked but much more importantly WHY WOULD YOU PUT YOURSELF OR YOUR CREW IN DANGER?
